BOOMERANG YOUTH RECOGNITION AWARD

The following students represent the Boomerang Youth Recognition Award recipients for **April's Asset #25 Reading for Pleasure.** Young person reads for pleasure most days of the week, either alone, with family members, or with friends.

Elementary: Brecken Schmidt, 4th Grade, Doyle ES



If the Doyle Library gave "frequent reader" miles like the airlines do, fourth-grader Brecken Schmidt would have earned a trip around the world this year! As the library opens each morning, Brecken is usually here, searching the shelves for his next book. One popular series is the Who Was/Who is biographies. Our collection has over 35 of these books, and Brecken is near the end of the series! His favorites include Charles Darwin and Ernest Shackleton. What is most remarkable about Brecken's love of reading is the great change we've observed from last school year. During 3rd grade, Brecken checked out 28 books from the library. So far in 4th grade, Brecken has checked out 114 books including biographies, non-fiction, classics, and historical fiction. Not only is his newfound passion for books helping Brecken, but we've noticed that it's contagious! He

is recommending books and series to his classmates, and his younger brother has caught the reading bug as well. When Brecken's brother was in the library with a stack of books to check out, we asked him if he was becoming a super-reader just like his brother. He beamed and said, "Yes!"

It's been thrilling to see this whole new world open up to Brecken—a world of books!

Middle School: Charlotte Segal, 9th Grade, Tamanend MS



Charlotte Segal is a voracious and passionate reader who takes every opportunity to explore new literature. She began middle school as a very quiet student, almost hiding herself in her books. In 7th and 8th grade, she read constantly, but said very little about her books. By 9th grade, Charlotte's passion for reading became the vehicle for her to let her true self emerge. By volunteering in the library, she made friends with peers who also love books. Charlotte has so emerged from her shell through reading that as a 9th grader she has given multiple book talks to 8th grade classes. She speaks enthusiastically about genres, characters, plot lines, and themes. She enjoys having in-depth conversations with her peers about the books she reads. She also was the captain of her Reading Olympics team, clearly wanting to do well, but wanting to have fun in the process too. There is never a day when Charlotte doesn't have a book with her to read. The joy on

Charlotte's face as she is reading is a wonderful thing to see. If asked "What is your favorite thing to do?" Charlotte would undoubtedly respond, "Read."

High School: Jacob Scupp. 11th Grade, CB West HS



Jacob reads as much as any other student I've encountered. He always finds time to work in reading for pleasure. This year alone, he has read all sorts of books. He began reading a book about America's encounters in Japan in the 1850s, an interest that led into his National History Day project theme being Commodore Perry's Opening of Japan. He followed that up by borrowing Raj: The British in India from my shelves. Later, he pounded through a Noam Chomsky reader. At the same time, he reads the Wall Street Journal every day. In class, he reads quickly through our material (not haphazardly; it simply doesn't take him long). Then he will literally open up the newspaper as he patiently waits for others to finish. If he gets through the paper by second block, when he has my class, he'll turn to other reading until his peers complete the work. I received a grant to buy books from

Penguin Random House, and each time a shipment came in, Jacob would excitedly go through the books with me. I received the last books in January, and already he has read two of them. Jacob is a student who reads voraciously and gets excited to share what he's learned with both peers and educators.




